

**Westcott entries in the  
Summary of Fully-licensed Houses and Beer Houses  
in the Petty Sessional Division of Dorking  
February 1892**

**Crown** Fully Licensed.

Owned by Trustee of J Cheesman, deceased.

Licensee: Wm Goose.

Tied for beer to Young of Dorking.

3 bedrooms and 2 rooms on 1<sup>st</sup> floor for travellers and persons requiring refreshment other than drink. Stabling for 10 horses.

Frequented by tradesmen and working men.

**Prince of Wales** Fully Licensed.

Owned by Mr Griffin Beall of Devon.

Licensee: John Tucker.

Tied for beer to Attlee's Brewery of Tooting

3 bedrooms and large club room for travellers and persons requiring refreshment other than drink. Stabling for 3 horses.

Frequented by tradesmen and working men.

**The Cabin** Beer House with On and Off Licence.

Owned by Executors of J Truelove, decd. Leased to Messrs Lascelles & Co. Guildford.

Licensee: Charles Henley

Tied to Lascelles & Co.

No accommodation or stabling.

Frequented by mostly low class of working men and suspected persons.

**Uncle Tom's Cabin** Beer House with On and Off Licence.

Owned and licensed to Edward Skelton

Free House.

No accommodation or stabling

Frequented by working men.

**Bricklayers' Arms** Beer House with On and Off Licence.

Owned by Mr J Johnson.

Licensee Rebecca Greathurst.

Free House.

No accommodation but stabling for 2 horses.

Frequented by working men.

**Cricketers** Beer House with On and Off Licence.

Owned by Messrs Hodgson & Co., Kingston.

Licensee J Westgate.

Tied to Hodgson & Co.

No accommodation or stabling.

Frequented by mostly low class of labouring men.

In **March 1903** the Dorking Advertiser reported a drive to reduce the number of licensed premises in and around Dorking. All were visited and a report prepared which included the following references to Westcott :

**Prince of Wales:** Leased to Wm Attlee of the Tooting Brewery (tied for beer only) Limited accommodation for travellers, only one spare bedroom. Ample accomodation with stabling for 3 horses. But Crown only 50 yards away.

**The Cabin:** C Henley for Lascelles & Tickner

**Uncle Tom's Cabin:** W Lawrence for Messrs Boxall

**Bricklayers Arms:** Beerhouse let to Mr J Johnson by Messrs Saville & Co. Back parlour should be closed or communication made between front and back bars.

**Cricketers** Lascelles & Tickner Tap Room requires closing up. Of three entrances, one should be closed so that anybody going in to the Tap Room should be better under observation.
