

THE COURAGE TO CHANGE OUR MINDS

Amid many of the trends accelerated by social media and set to be turbocharged by the development of AI in the years ahead, I find the development of echo chambers

the most amona concerning. A recent by Ofcom report showed that social media platforms with their bias-confirmina alaorithms dominate most the top five popular IJK news sources among 16-Throughout 24s (1). human history people have been drawn to

others who agree with them, and we all probably have our preferred sources of news which may indeed confirm our own perspective. It takes discipline and thought to meaningfully engage with ideas that

we disagree with.

It takes genuine courage to come to a realisation that we have changed our mind.

This is one of the reasons that I was as surprised as anyone when Ayaan Hirsi Ali, one of the dominant voices in the New Atheist movement alongside Richard Dawkins and Christopher Hitchens, wrote an article on UnHerd back in November titled 'Why I am now a Christian' (2). Her own journey is quite extraordinary – from radial Islam under the Muslim Brotherhood in Nairobi, onto devout atheism, and now a self-declared Christian. She has faced considerable backlash from a

vocal minority of the atheist community some of whom are quite understandably seeking to understand disagree her reasoning, while others are simply looking to undermine her personally to avoid having their world view threatened.

It also takes courage to change your mind. It also takes courage to enter into meaningful dialogue and relationship with those that you disagree with on things which are of central importance to your identity.

I am always struck by the example of Francis Collins, a brilliant Scientist who was the director of the Human Genome Project before being nominated by Barrak Obama to be the director of the National Institute of Health – a position he held for

twelve years. His appointment was severely criticised by leading atheists, notably the Harvard Psychologist Stephen Pinker, on the basis that someone who is an active and vocal Christian with "primitive, shamanistic, superstitious" religious views could not be scientifically objective. At the end of Collins' tenure Pinker wrote that he had changed his mind on the basis of the "sheer competence and skill with which he's directed the Institutes" and the fact that Collins could effectively communicate scientific principles to those who were suspicious of the scientific establishment (3).

Collins also struck up an unlikely friendship with the prominent New Atheist

Christopher Hitchens (who described their relationship across the faith divide as "the greatest armed truce in modern times"). Shortly before



Hitchens death from cancer. he described Collins both as "one of the areatest living Americans" and that he was one of the most devout believers he had encountered.

Meaningful relationships with 'the other' allow us to engage



and grow. The echo chamber is far more comfortable and convenient for most of us.

I am grateful to the people in my life who have challenged my

understanding of faith from a place of trusted relationship – whether Atheist,

Agnostic, Muslim or Hindu – I still disagree with them about who God is (or isn't), but they have deepened my understanding of my own faith and what it means for me to live as a Christian and a fully alive Human Being.

Welcome to 2024, a new year full of possibilities and new adventures.



We rounded off 2023 in Westcott with some lovely community events from the Westfestivity ranaina Christmas Fair which saw both the village hall and the church full of life, Green Westcott Community Garden's "Mistletoe Rhyme" evening at St Johns early in December and the singing of Christmas Carols



around t h Christmas Tree on the village green a few days before Christmas. All these events were a great

reminder of what a thriving and welcomina community we in - thank you to everyone who gave their time to organise them.

The WVA Open Meeting at the beginning of December was another welcome opportunity to gather and

discuss village news. We were pleased to welcome Jacky Fryson the new Executive Head Teacher \circ f our lovely village school, Surrey Hills All Saints Primary



School and also Nancy Lund from Green Westcott Community Garden both of whom spoke passionately about engaging with the village and being part of the community.

The main focus of the meeting was an update from the WVA's own James Leaver on planning matters. This focused largely on the bitterly disappointing news that despite well organised and strong objections from the community and the WVA, the Planning Inspector appointed to hear the Public Inquiry in to the Sondes Place Farm Planning Appeal, allowed the appeal thus overturning the decision made by MVDC to refuse the outline planning permission. This now paves the way for development on this Green Belt land.

Whilst the Inspector acknowledged the potential harm to the Green Belt he weighed the lack of housing delivery in the district and the consequential shortfall in affordable housing provision so significantly

that he deemed the development permissible. He was evaluating the proposals against the existing, rather than the emerging Local Plan, which MVDC paused a year ago citing the Government review of The National Planning Policy Framework. The pausing of the emerging Local Plan is significant as it informs whether potential development sites within the Green Belt are in or out of the Local Plan. The WVA will continue to push MVDC for action on the Local Plan. With regard to Sondes Place Farm, our attention will now turn to influencing MVDC to ensure strong mitigations are in place for the impact on local infrastructure, in particular traffic, as a result of the development.

Changes to the WVA team

After five years as part of the WVA team, Edwin Harland, has signalled his intention to stand down as our Treasurer at the AGM in June and so we are looking for a new Treasurer to come and join us. It would be ideal if someone could step forward in the



next couple of months so they can shadow Edwin through the year-end report and accounts process which isn't onerous but obviously requires great diligence. So if one of your New Year's resolutions was to get involved in something new and make a difference to the community you live in, this is an ideal opportunity and we would love to hear from you.

WESTCOTT VILLAGE HALL UPDATE



Just over 200 people attended the public consultation event in November and in excess of 250 completed a questionnaire. Our advisers have commented that they cannot recall a consultation with such strong participation and positive contribution. Thank you for your part in this.



The overwhelming message is that 95% of respondents were in favour of reproviding a community building which provides broad support for this project. We have clarity from this consultation on the overall preferences but it would be inappropriate for us to confirm these, or commit further expense, until we have had the opportunity to test these in a pre-application meeting with Mole Valley Council. This meeting is now being arranged.

Aside from more specific neighbour comments, key comments which we have noted as a priority for our ongoing work include:-

 Furlong Road - managing the potential loss of some on street parking on Furlong Road and addressing congestion concerns.

- 2. Size of the community building to be no smaller than the existing hall and preferably larger, to consider an upper level and to maximise parking.
- 3. Regarding the residential element of this project smaller houses are preferred.
- 4. Sustainability to ensure that the new community building is adaptable, robust, low maintenance, has modern eco credentials and provides a lasting positive impact for the community.
- 5. Business Plan reassurance that the trustees can present a business plan which supports the on-going operation of the hall going forward.

We will provide further updates to you by email and via the usual village news channels as we move the project towards a planning application in 2024.

Save the dates – just one hour – on 26th to 28th January 2024

Big Garden Birdwatch is the UK's largest garden wildlife survey. It's been running since 1979, and every year, around 700,000 people take part. It takes place over the last weekend in January each year. In 2024, Big Garden Birdwatch will be back on the 26th-28th January. If you are interested in getting involved you can sign up and register with the RSPB from mid December 2023.



On the weekend of the Big Garden Birdwatch itself, taking part is really

easy. You just spend an hour watching the birds in your garden, from your balcony or in your local park, and record what you've seen. If you see very few birds or none at all, that's also really useful information for the RSPB, so please do let them know.

Big Garden Birdwatch is important citizen science. It provides a vital snapshot of how the UK's garden birds are doing. This gives a good impression of the birds that are doing well, and the ones that are struggling. As the first Birdwatch took place more than 40 years ago, the RSPB now have a wealth of data to look

back on.

The UK has lost 38 million birds in the last 50 years, so it's crucial we do all we can to look after our bird life.



Big Garden Birdwatch helps to monitor how garden birds are getting on. Also, people taking part in Big Garden Birdwatch for the first time often find it sparks their interest in nature, especially in children. And then we hope they'll start giving nature a helping hand through feeding their garden birds, putting up nestboxes and gardening in a wildlife-friendly way – actions that can make all the difference to nature.

WESTCOTT HISTORY GROUP



60 Years of Surrey Hills Society by Ken Bare



On Tuesday 14th November Ken Bare, a Warden of the Society, gave us a lecture on the changing nature of the

countryside in Surrey over the last six or seven decades since 1950. Generally known as an AONB - Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty - a national review of designated landscapes in 2021 has recommended that such areas be better named as a National Landscape, to better reflect their national importance and elevate them alongside National Parks. The first area to adopt the new branding was the Cotswold Conservation Board.

The role of the Society is to focus on issues related to climate change, biodiversity and sustainability in its National Landscape, and to foster collaboration and action to preserve and enhance the natural beauty of the Surrey Hills for future generations. A Surrey Hills Symposium is held once a year to bring together experts on the relevant issues, conservation groups and businesses such as farming and others using the woodlands in order to identify issues and develop guidance on the management of the area.

Surrey is the most wooded county in England with some 22.4% covered in woodland. Over the centuries woodland trees have provided the means of building houses, of making numerous farming wagons, carriages and implements including domestic tools, of providing charcoal for various purposes including iron smelting, glass works and gunpowder and to provide the Navy with ships, vital for a mercantile nation. The nobility made use of woodland to encourage the development of wildlife, both birds and animals, which could be hunted.



While a lot of these practical uses have declined, many woodland areas provide areas of beauty and a place for leisure in our modern world. Around the Leith Hill slopes the practice of coppicing to make charcoal is still prevalent.

WESTCOTT HISTORY GROUP (cont.)



Pollarding used to be a common way of controlling the excessive growth of trees along roads and driveways, but this practice is much neglected nowadays. However, around the roads of Westcott the annual care of hedges, especially on the A25, is very good (with a few notable exceptions), particularly beside the village green and at the bottom of Westcott Street.

In Surrey the well known woods of Abinger Roughs, Polesden Lacey, Staffhurst Wood near Oxted and the slopes of Leith Hill have a mix of broad-leaved trees including oak, birch, beech, chestnut, hornbeam and ash which provide a glorious colour in autumn. A notable place to visit is Langley Vale WWI Centenary Wood near Epsom.

Probably the most visible changes over the years have been the reduction of cultivated farmland and the change in farming of animals. In earlier years fields were ploughed with horses and harvested by horses and men into sheaves and stacks. The villages were populated by farm workers. On the farms, pigs and poultry were a common sight. There were still blacksmiths in most villages to service the shoeing of horses and repair of ironwork. As the use of horses declined many blacksmiths adopted different trades, including repair of automobiles. Happily we still see pasture fields with 'saddle back' cattle grazing in them.



Conservation grazing on heathland

Many areas which used to be covered in heathland, such as Headley Heath and the slopes of Leith Hill have been planted with trees. It is Surrey County Council's ambition to be a carbon neutral county by 2050. Their Climate Change Strategy is to facilitate the planting of 1.2 million new trees by 2030. There is a good deal of science involved in large scale tree planting. The role of multiple mycorrhizal interactions across a woodland is vital in helping to transfer

water, nitrogen and carbon in a large underground system. In return the tree provides sugar from photosynthesis through its leaves.

The type of soil and the natural woodland floor play an important part in the growth of trees. We see plantations of pines which are harvested for wood pulp to make paper, but these are short term commercial projects in a woodland timeframe.

In the last 10 years we have seen the removal of many pylons to improve the outlook in woodland areas. The

Reigate to Guildford railway line was served by steam engine trains until 1965 and these have now been replaced by diesel motor engines although we still see a steam engine train on the line below Ranmore Common from time to time. Villages in the county, such as Shere, have been encouraged by the Surrey County Council to give their centres a special identity.

Our next talk is on Tuesday 9th January with the subject 'The trouble with bees' - a review



of the importance of bees, some beekeeping facts and the threats honey bees face at our usual venue in St Johns Hall at 8pm. A 98 year old lady wrote this letter to her bank. The bank manager thought it amusing enough to have it published in The Times. I thought it might inspire our readers to even further heights!

Dear Sir

I am writing to thank you for bouncing my cheque with which I endeavoured to pay my plumber last month. By my calculations, three 'nanoseconds' must have elapsed between his presenting the cheque and the arrival in my account of the funds needed to honour it. I refer, of course, to the automatic monthly deposit of my Pension, an arrangement which, I admit, has been in place for only eight years. You are to be commended for seizing that brief window of opportunity, and also for debiting my account £30 by way of penalty for the inconvenience caused to your bank.

My thankfulness springs from the manner in which this incident has caused me to rethink my errant financial ways.

I noticed that whereas I personally attend to your telephone calls and letters, when I try to contact you, I am confronted by the impersonal, overcharging, re-recorded, faceless entity which your bank has become. From now on, I, like you, choose only to deal with a flesh-and-blood person. My mortgage and loan payments will therefore



and hereafter no longer be automatic, but will arrive at your bank by cheque, addressed personally and confidentially to an employee at your bank whom you must nominate.

Be aware that it is an offence under the Postal Act for any other person to open such an envelope.

Please find attached an Application Contact Status which I require your chosen employee to complete. I am sorry it runs to eight pages, but in order that I know as much about him or her as your bank knows about me, there is no alternative. Please note that all copies of his or her medical history must be countersigned by a Solicitor, and the mandatory details of his/her financial situation (income,

debts, assets and liabilities) must be accompanied by documented proof. In due course, I will issue your employee with a PIN number which he/she must quote in dealings with me. I regret that it cannot be shorter than 28 digits but, again, I have modelled it on the number of button presses required of me to access my account balance on your phone bank service. As they say, imitation is the sincerest form of flattery.

Let me level the playing field even further. When you call me, press buttons as follows:

- 1-- To make an appointment to see me.
- 2-- To query a missing payment.
- 3-- To transfer the call to my living room in case I am there.
- 4-- To transfer the call to my bedroom in case I am sleeping.
- 5-- To transfer the call to my toilet in case I am attending to nature.
- 6-- To transfer the call to my mobile phone if I am not at home.
- 7-- To leave a message on my computer. A password to access my computer is required. A password will be communicated to you at a later date to the Authorized Contact.
- 8-- To return to the main menu and to listen to options 1 through 8
- 9-- To make a general complaint or inquiry, the contact will then be put on hold, pending the attention of my automated answering service.

While this may, on occasion, involve a lengthy wait, uplifting music will play for the duration of the call.


Regrettably, but again following your example, I must also levy an establishment fee to cover the setting up of this new arrangement.

Let us be the ARK

This winter I have been reading We are the ARK by Mary Reynolds - a call to action, to return our gardens to their true nature, via Acts of Restorative Kindness (ARK). The idea grew out of the author's increasing awareness of the collapse of biodiversity and the lack of safe space for wildlife.

Wildlife, in particular insects, have been declining in numbers over the past decades. Many of us are aware of this as we will have observed the lack of splattered insects on our car windscreens, compared to that in our youth.

For

project based on the 'windscreen phenomenon'. People all around the country take part in an annual survey, using a 'splatometer' grid to record the number of insects squashed on their car registration plate. This mirrors a similar survey conducted by the RSPB in 2004. The results have revealed a 50% reduction of insects in Kent over the last 20 years.

This is not an issue restricted to the UK. A study in Europe showed a 75% decline in insect biomass in protected areas over recent decades. This devastatina scale of loss should be of huge concern to us all - insects are an essential part of our interdependent web of life! "Insects are the food that make all the birds and make all the fish," says David Wagner, an entomologist and university professor. "They're the fabric tethering together freshwater and terrestrial ecosystem across the planet."

The web of life thrives on diversity and each species has its role to play. Insects play a vital role in pollination and soil health. With their decline, our environment falls into disarray and our food system will be severely affected. Three quarters of leading global food crops rely to some extent on animal pollination. Put simply - less pollinators, less food.

So what can we do to help reverse this decline?

Two of the main causes of insect loss in the UK are habitat loss and pesticide use. While industrialised agriculture is responsible for much of this, our gardens can be hostile places for

insects too. We must now do all we can to bring ourselves back into right relationship with the rest of the web of life, upon which we depend to survive. We can each play a role in supporting life to thrive and we can start right where we are!



Co-create an ARK

One way of helping nature to thrive is through Acts of Restorative Kindness - making sure that we are sharing kindly the patches of earth where we live. Whether we are responsible for a windowbox or a garden, we can all help create a place of refuge for the countless other creatures who also call it home.

Creating an ARK space means thinking a bit differently, intentionally allowing nature to heal the land with her choice of plants, rather than impose orderliness and showy blooms. Aim to please nature, rather than human society. A simple sign to declare your ARK may help others to appreciate what you are doing and inspire them to create their own!

Reconsider your lawn

The concept of a lawn grew rapidly durina the Industrial Revolution as a status symbol. Before then predominantly only very wealthy people could afford to have land where thev were not arowina their own food. At a time of huge biodiversity loss, it makes sense to turn as much land as possible back to a more natural state, rather than devote time, money and effort to sterile 'lawn enforcement'.



Ditch chemicals

Gardens now typically use ten times more chemicals per acre than industrially farmed agricultural land. The aim is to let life thrive, not poison things. Hopefully soon natural insect predators will return to help keep your

ARK ecosystem in balance.

Water

A small bowl of water, with a twig or stone as a ramp to allow creatures to escape will be a beneficial addition. if there is no natural water in your ARK.

Native plants

Many of the plants that want to grow in our soils we have considered 'weeds'. ignoring the value that they have in supporting local insects and restoring the correct natural balance to soils and habitats. Native plants - those that grow naturally in the area where they have evolved - are essential in creating safe spaces for wildlife.

Wherever we live, the plants native to a particular area will provide just the right food for other members of the local wildlife community. We have a lot to learn from nature's intelligence!


